Died 1890 at the home of his friend, John Flaherty, near the Kennedy Mine. (No Death record is on file)(Fleming's death is recorded in the Amador County Federations of Women's Clubs publication April 1927 Page 101)

Part owner of the Kennedy and the Oneida Mines. According to the Amador Dispatch of April 8, 1865, J. Flemming was robbed at the Oneida Mills while he was sleeping. Two watches and \$74.00 in cash were taken, (See attached news paper article)

Other partners in the Kennedy Mine were Andrew Kennedy, Brady Bergon, and James Fleming. (Note this information can be found in Book A Mining Claims, which is missing from the Amador County Recorders office) If this book is found the names will be found in book A page 147 Feb. 5, 1886.

James Fleming, James Bergen were both Naturalized on the same day and may have come to the United States together. While talking to the County Recorder, he told me that under witnesses on the Naturalization record, this was the sponsors. It seems that Fleming, Bergen and Kennedy may have been partners in the Kennedy mine. (Note this can only be proven by finding the missing book from the County Recorder's Office.

Fleming was married to Clara Fleming. (Note no Marriage Certificate is on file)

Witnesseth, that the said party of the first part for and consideration of the sum of eight hundred dollars lawful money of the United States of America to him in hand paid the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, has granted bargained, sold, remised, conveyed and quit claimed and by these presents does grant bargain sell remised convey and quit claim unto the said party of the second part and to his heirs and assigns forever all the right title and interest of the said party of the first part ~~unto the said party of the second part~~ ~~and to his heirs and assigns forever~~ ~~all the right title and interest of the said party of the first part in and to the undivided one third part of that certain piece or parcel of land lying and being in the town of Sutter Creek in Amador County and State of California and bounded as follows to wit. On the North by George H. H. & P. & B. on the East by property of Joseph Smith on the South by the Methodist Church property and on the West by the Public road leading through said town of Sutter Creek to the town of Jackson in said County of Amador and more particularly known as the Benjamin Blacksmith Shop lot also the undivided one half of all the Blacksmith's tools now used in or about said shop and the undivided one half of all the stocks now on hand and owned and used by the said party of the first part in and about the business of Blacksmithing together with all and singular the tenements hereditaments and appurtenances thereto belonging and the rents issues and profits thereof To have and to hold all and singular the above described premises together with the appurtenances, unto the said party of the second part his heirs and assigns forever.
